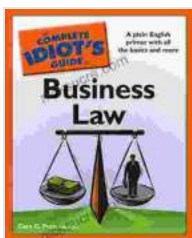

Sentence Structure

A sentence is a group of words that expresses a complete thought. Sentences can be simple or complex. Simple sentences have one independent clause. Complex sentences have one independent clause and one or more dependent clauses.

Independent Clauses

An independent clause is a group of words that can stand alone as a sentence. It contains a subject and a verb.

Example: The dog barked.

Dependent Clauses

A dependent clause is a group of words that cannot stand alone as a sentence. It contains a subject and a verb, but it also contains a subordinating conjunction, such as because, although, or since.

Example: Because the dog was hungry, it barked.

Sentence Length

Sentences should be kept to a reasonable length. Long sentences can be difficult to read and understand. Aim for sentences that are no more than 20 words long.

Sentence Variety

Grammar

Subject-Verb Agreement

The subject of a sentence must agree with the verb in number.

Example: The dog barks. (singular subject, singular verb)

The dogs bark. (plural subject, plural verb)

Pronoun Agreement

Pronouns must agree with their antecedents in number and gender.

Example: The dog wagged its tail.

The dogs wagged their tails.

Verb Tense

The tense of a verb indicates the time of an action or event.

Example: The dog is barking. (present tense)

The dog barked. (past tense)

The dog will bark. (future tense)

Punctuation

Punctuation is used to clarify the meaning of sentences. The most common punctuation marks are the period, comma, semicolon, and colon.

Period

A period is used to end a sentence.

Example: The dog is barking.

Comma

A comma is used to separate items in a list, to separate independent clauses, and to set off nonessential information.

Example: The dog, the cat, and the mouse all lived in the same house.

The dog is barking, but I don't know why.

Semicolon

A semicolon is used to separate independent clauses that are closely related.

Example: The dog is barking; the cat is hissing.

Colon

A colon is used to introduce a list or a quotation.

Example: The following items are required: a pen, a pencil, and a notebook.

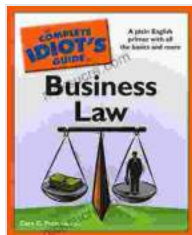

- * Proofread your writing carefully before submitting it.

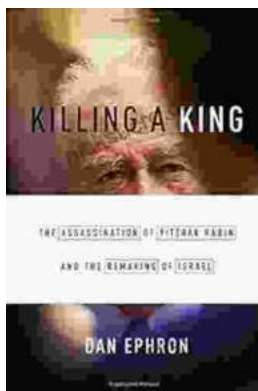
