
Brecht on Performance: Messingkauf and Modelbooks | Performance Books

The Messingkauf

The Messingkauf was Brecht's theory of performance that he developed in the 1930s. 

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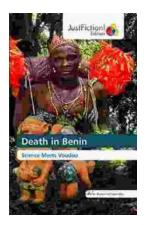
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
