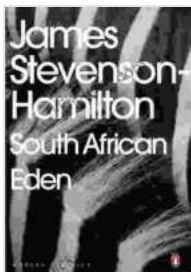


Eden James Stevenson Hamilton: A South African Conservation Pioneer Whose Legacy Lives On

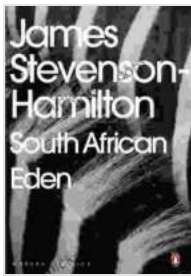

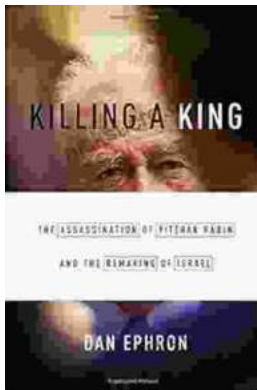
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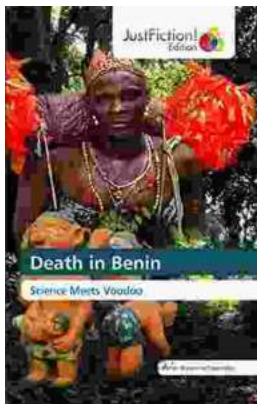
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
