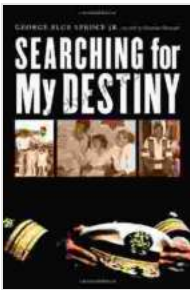

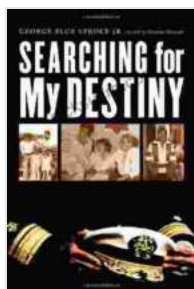
Hope for the Future

"We are a people of the sun, moon, and stars. We are a people of the earth, water, and fire. We are a people of hope, strength, and resilience. We are a people of destiny."



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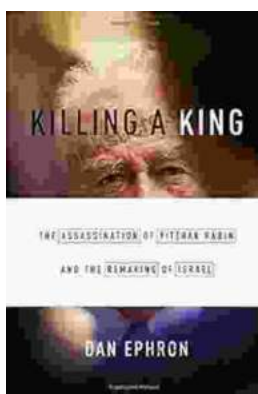
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
