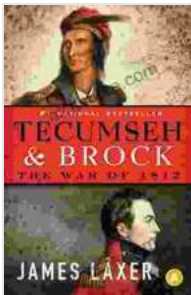


Tecumseh and Brock: The War of 1812

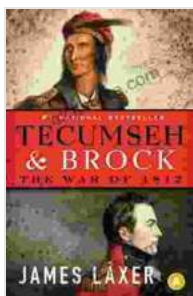

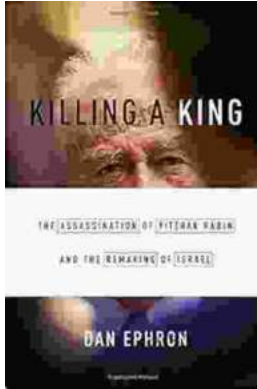

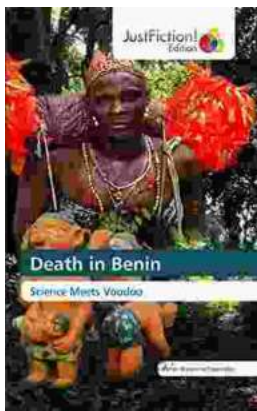
