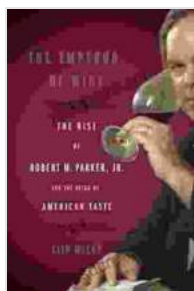

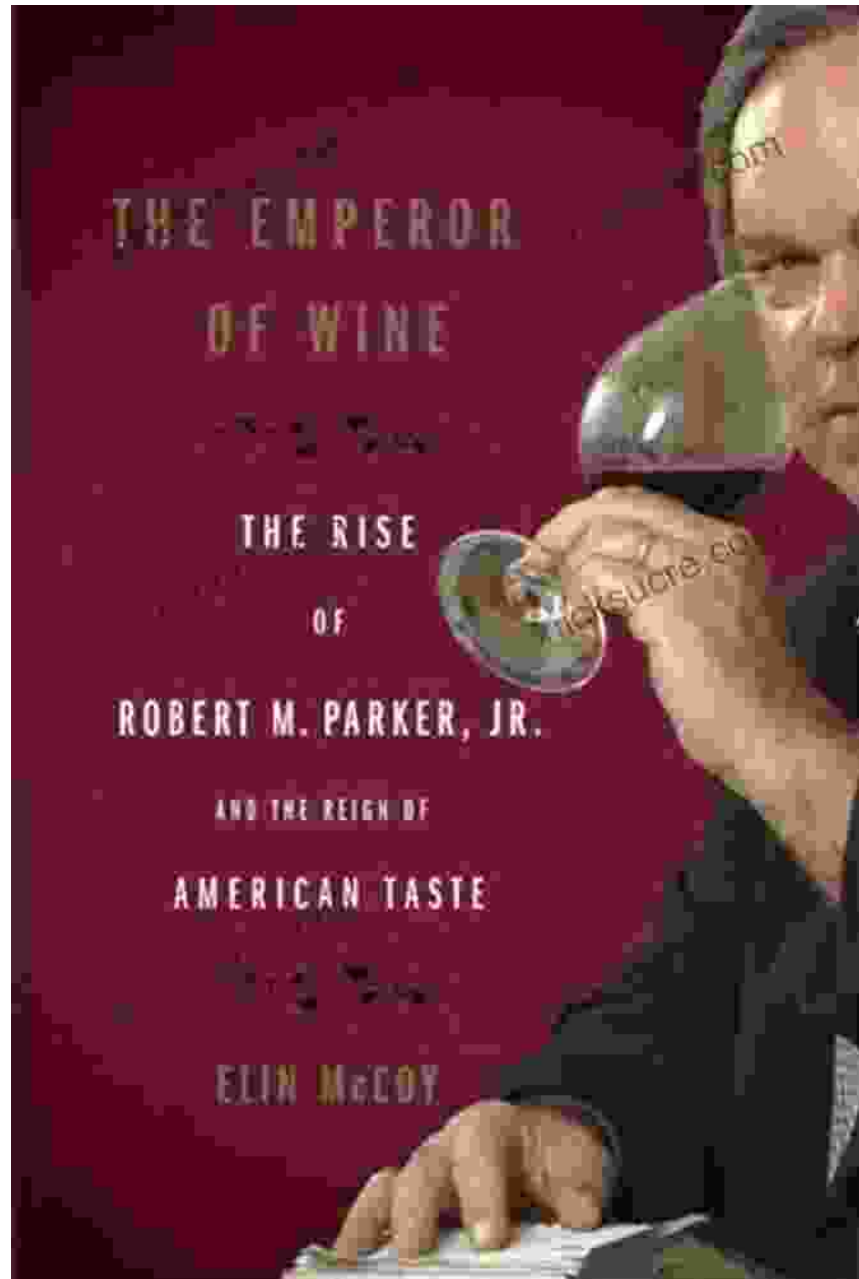

Parker's major contribution to wine criticism was his iconic 100-point scoring system. Unlike previous rating methods, the Parker Point System provided consumers with a straightforward, numerical assessment of a wine's quality. Wines rated 90 points or higher were considered exceptional, while those below 80 were deemed undrinkable.

The Parker Point System became a powerful marketing tool, as wineries sought to attain high scores to boost sales. In time, it became the de facto standard for wine evaluation, influencing collectors and enthusiasts alike.

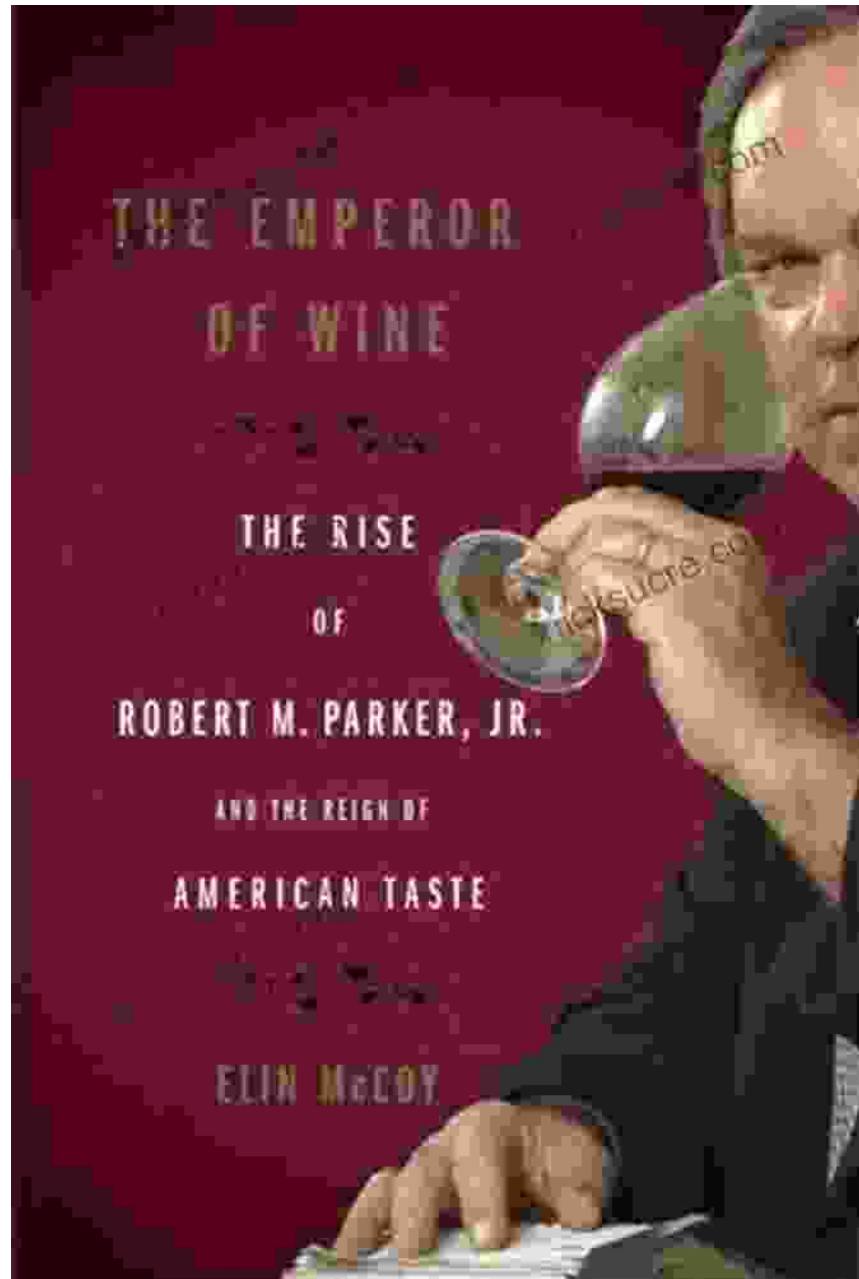

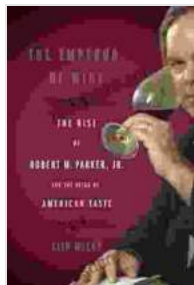

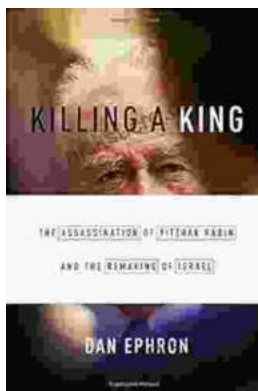
