
The Story of Tim Hetherington: War Photographer, Filmmaker, and Humanitarian



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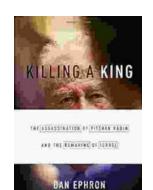
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
