All citizens have direct participation in the government decisions

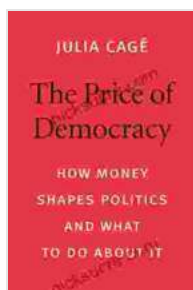
Representative Democracy

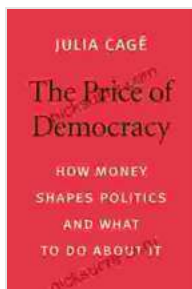
