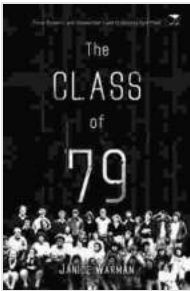


Three Students Who Risked Their Lives to Destroy Apartheid

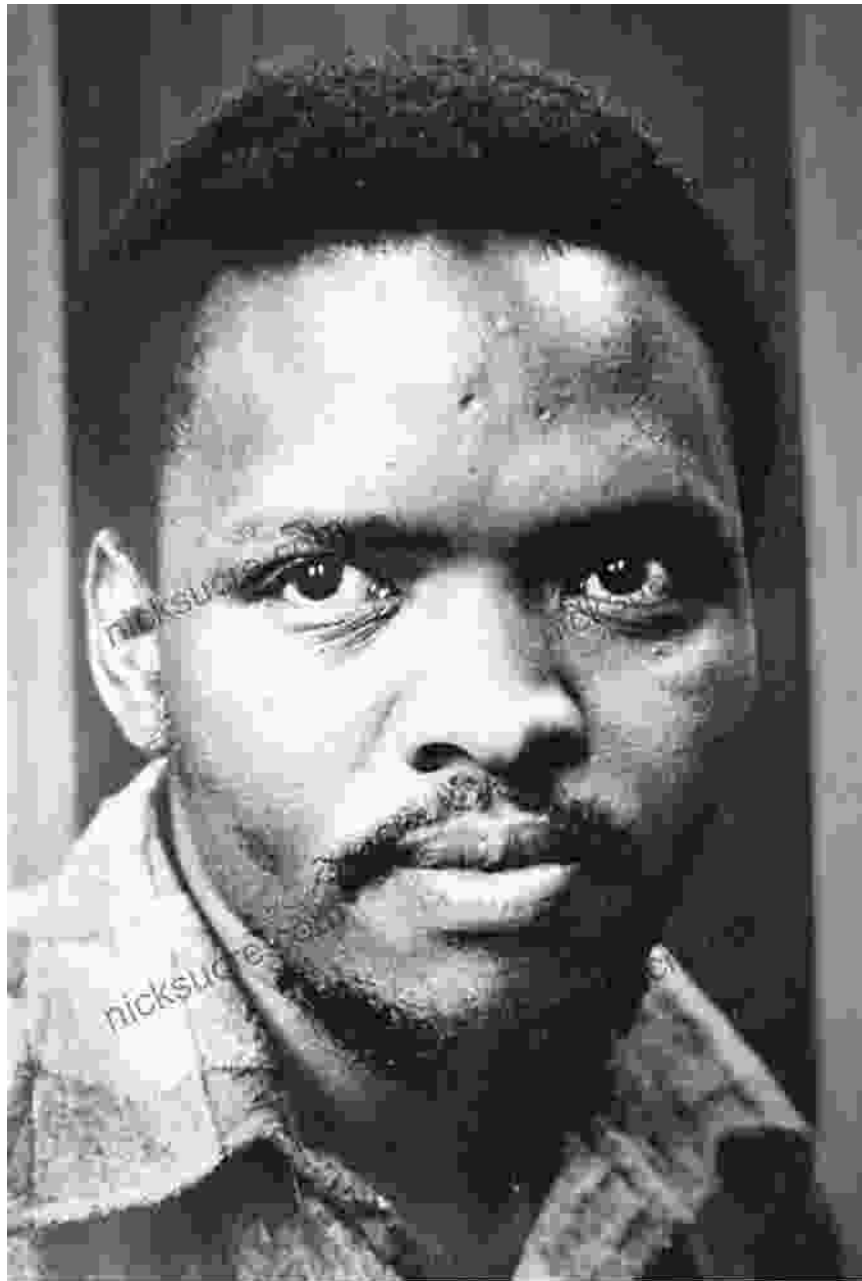

Denis Goldberg

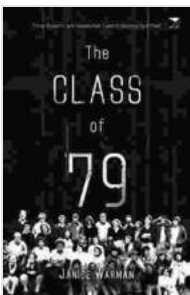
