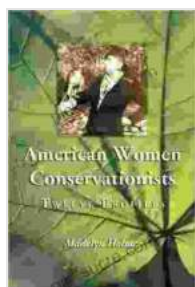

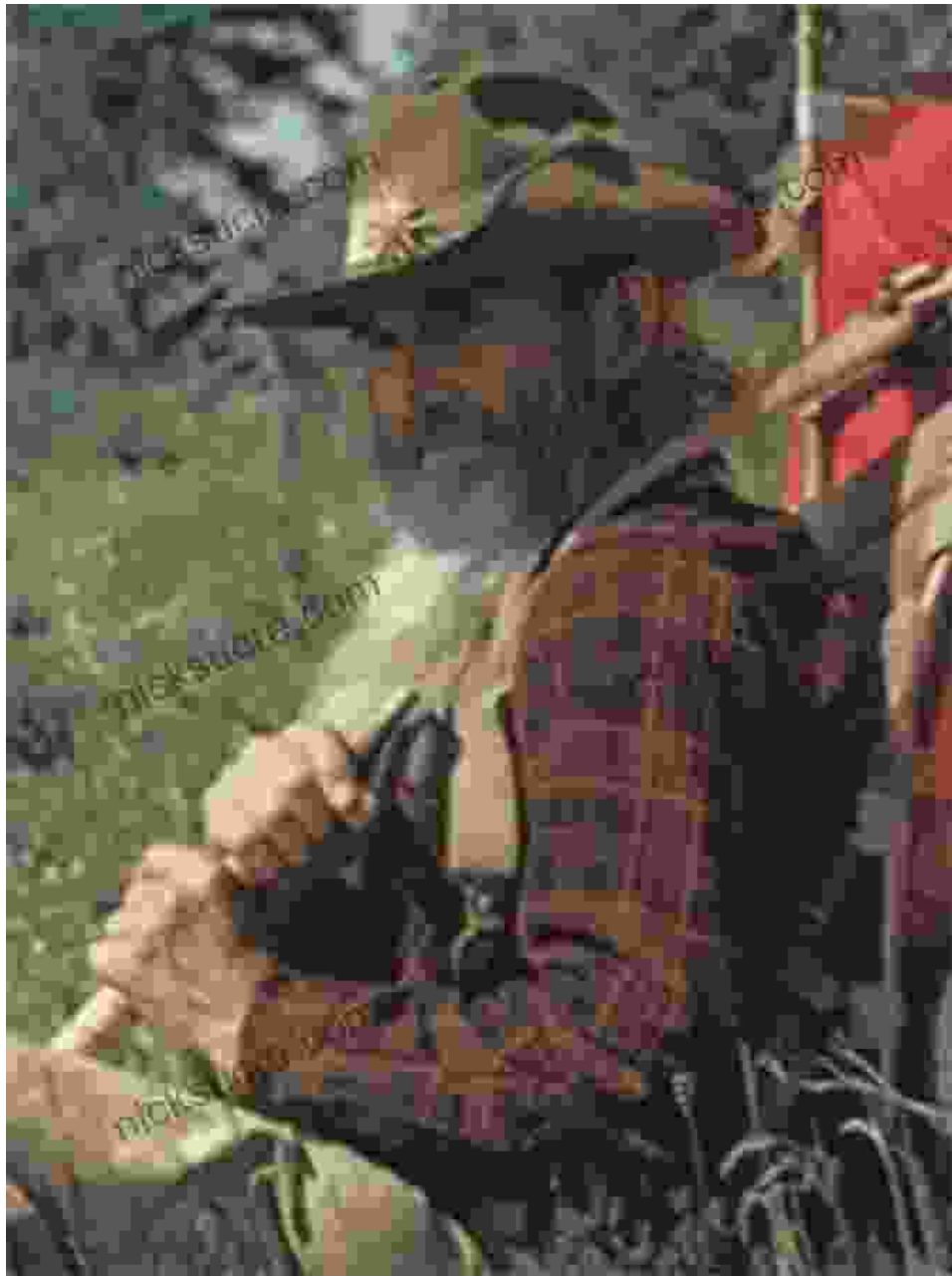

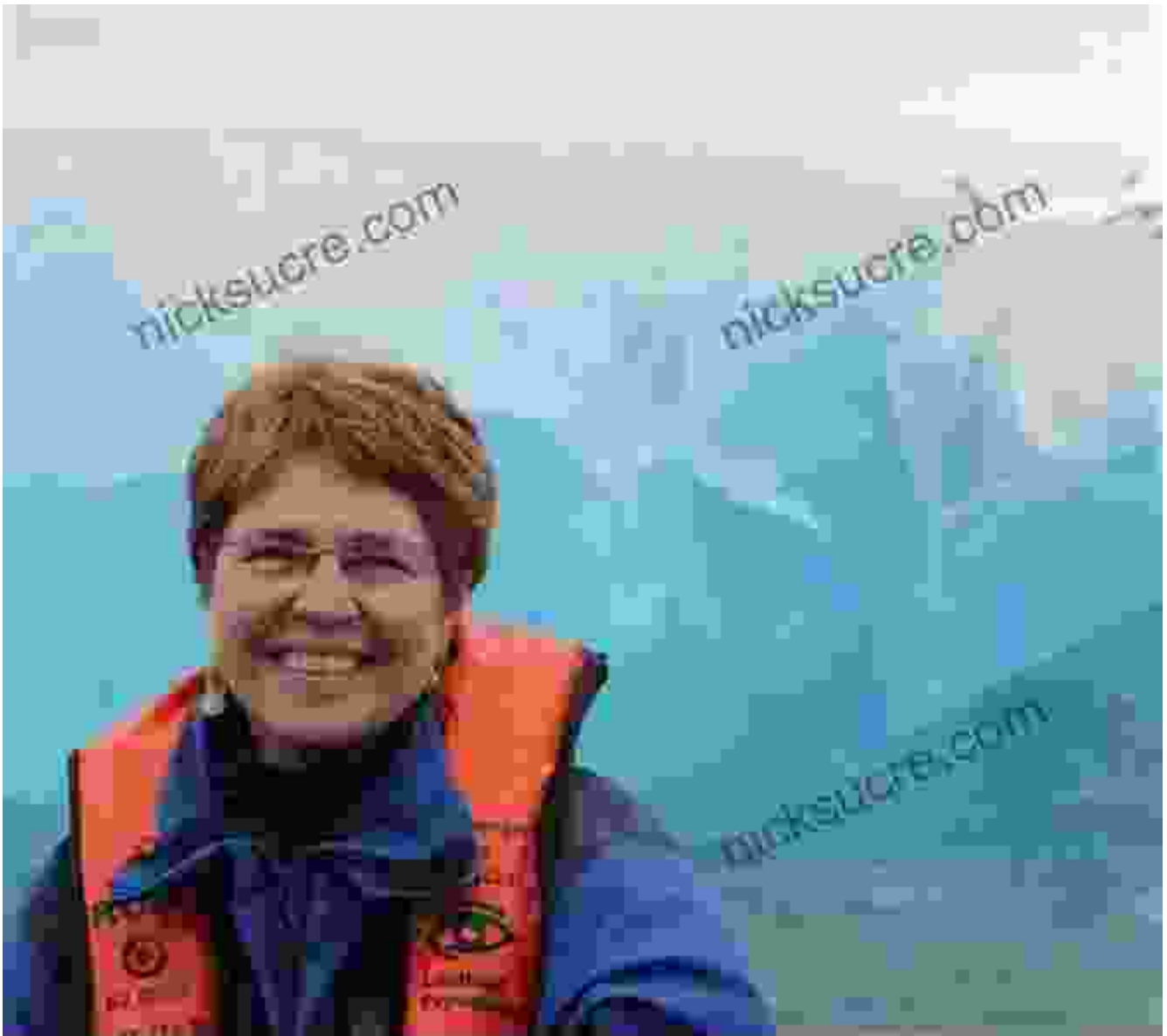
10. Hope Ryden (1924-2019)

12. Terry Tempest Williams (1955-)

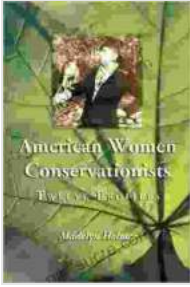

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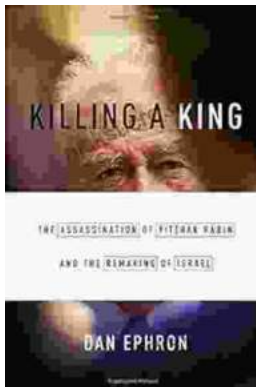
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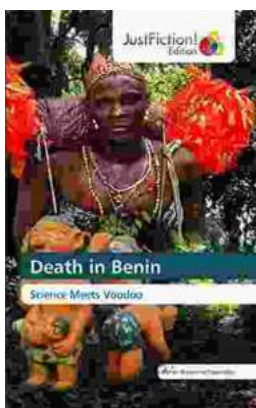
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
